A free football academy which counts Manchester City's Adam Johnson and Middlesbrough's Tony McMahon amongst its alumni, Cleveland Juniors FC relies on sponsorship and donations in order to survive.



Vandalism had left the club without adequate changing facilities and without the grant from the Philanthropic Foundation, the club may have not been allowed to continue under FA guidelines.

Chair of the club Michelle Rush, said: "Vandals had burnt down our changing room and we were concerned that without changing and toilet facilities we would not be able to run the club until our new building was finished.

"The £5000 we received from the Philanthropic Foundation meant that we were able to rent changing facilities and a portable toilet until our new building is completed next year. It's not ideal but it means we can keep the club running throughout 2012. especially during the busy summer months.

"We have more than 200 local players now and our numbers are growing all the time. So we also used part of the grant to buy equipment such as kits, goals, balls and bibs which constantly need replacing, and to train two more coaches which will allow us to welcome 100 more kids into the academy.

"We've been going since 1985 and we're proud that people like the Philanthropic Foundation buy into our ethos and help us to continue to be a sustainable club and a vital part of the community."

Charity patron Stewart Smith, chairman of Middlesbrough FC sponsors, Ramsdens Financial, said: "We are relatively new to the Foundation but already we can see the great work it does.

"To see so many local youngsters benefiting and enjoying themselves as a result of the club's hard work and the Foundation's help is a real boost and one which we are proud to be part of."

A primary school which prides itself on giving all pupils, regardless of ability, the best education possible was a perfect fit for the Foundation.

Pennyman Primary School in
Netherfields, Middlesbrough, is a
mainstream school with a dedicated
unit for children with complex
needs. Part of the bespoke
curriculum that the school offers the
pupils is an annual outward bound
trip. But as funds dwindled, this
year's trip became less and less
likely until the Philanthropic
Foundation stepped in.

Deputy Head for Inclusion at the school Odile Curry, said: "These trips are vital to the development and progress of the pupils. The children absolutely love them, they have a great time and the results, with regards to their development and improving their confidence, are fantastic.

"The money we received from the Philanthropic Foundation means that not only will this year's trip go ahead as planned, but we will also be taking more pupils – doubling the numbers to 30 and taking over the entire centre as oppose to just part of it.

"We are going to Peat Rigg in North Yorkshire. It's a working farm that offers a wide range of activities and experiences and the children are really looking forward to it.

"The donation that the Foundation has given us is absolutely fantastic. We can still hardly believe it – we danced all the way home after hearing the news!"

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Apprenticeship gets right to the hub of things

Langridge Initiative Centre is best described as the hub of the community. A resource centre slap bang in the middle of Berwick Hills, near to Park End in Middlesbrough, it provides local residents with somewhere to meet, somewhere to learn new skills, somewhere to search for jobs and somewhere to socialise with a café and crèche.

Set up in 1996 the centre is very well used by all ages with weekly bingo and housing and career advice sessions proving especially popular. But recent times have seen a distinct lack of funding which left centre manager Michael Finn with too many jobs and too little time.

With no budget to fund any extra staff Michael couldn't quite believe it when The Philanthropic Foundation stepped forward with funding for an apprenticeship at the centre.

Michael said: "The situation really was getting more and more difficult. The centre is well used and I literally didn't have enough hours in the day. Funding from the Foundation was an absolute godsend."

The funding was a godsend for someone else too – 20 year old Matthew Bennett from Linthorpe who was volunteering at the centre when the apprenticeship came up. He was successful in his application and is now the full-time IT technician at the centre.

Previously unemployed Matthew now spends his time at the centre helping people out in the IT suite with pc and web skills as well as covering general managerial and administrative responsibilities.

"The apprenticeship position was fantastic news for me and the centre. I was already volunteering here and really enjoyed it but obviously I needed to pay my way too so was going to have to move on at some point" said Matthew.

"I love working here I really enjoy helping people out and all of the new people I meet. I'm gaining more and more experience every day and learning new skills all the time too. It's great and I'm really grateful to the Philanthropic Foundation for the opportunity they have created for me here."

Neil Stephenson, chief executive officer at Onyx, is pleased to see charity funds improving IT in the area. He said: "It's fantastic to see this sort of initiative successfully working in the community.

Apprentices are a vital tool to business and Matthew and the Langridge Centre are a perfect example of how well it can work out for everyone involved. The positive results of this funding are obvious for all to see and that's why Onyx is proud to be a patron of the Foundation."

Michael added: "Matthew is a vital member of our team, we couldn't do without him – and we certainly couldn't do it without the help of the Foundation."

THE Foundation joined forces with TFM Radio's Cash for Kids to run a campaign with a difference.

The 'Better Tomorrow' campaign launched in February this year with a massive £30k kitty. Organisations and groups in Teesside were invited to apply for their share of the fund and all they had to do was; describe their organisation, how it makes a difference to and benefits local people and what a difference the extra funding would make.

The focus was on organisations that support and benefit children and the work that they do.

The response was tremendous. Applications flooded in with lots and lots of very worthwhile causes getting in touch. It was very tough, but eventually a shortlist was drawn up and the lucky few were invited to attend a special awards night

Organisations had been told they were on the shortlist and as you'd expect turnout was high. Patrons and trustees from the Foundation also came along to see the results of their support

The atmosphere was electric and anticipation was palpable. Each organisation's representative gave an overview of their group and what a difference the money would make to them, and a film showcasing their work was

Requests ranged from £4000 for sensory equipment-to a pair of football boots, with the specific needs of each group taken into consideration by the judges

And as the tension mounted it was crystal clear just how much this kind of funding was needed by each and every group.

But there was a twist in the tale. Every one of the invited 13 short listed organisations had been successful in their application.

"It was genuinely moving to see how much it means to these organisations to be given a little bit of financial help and how they were all rooting for each other. I can't think of more deserving groups for the Foundation to get involved with."

> From the Education Centre for Down's Syndrome and FROGs to Kidz Konnekt and Hartlepool Young Carers everyone got something and, despite the groups being ever so slightly misled to believe not all of them would be lucky enough to receive a grant, there was a strong sense of kinship amongst those attending – and an even greater sense of delight when they realised they would all be lucky enough to receive something.

How they make kids' lives better and really contribute to their communities. That's what the Foundation is all about.
